# Guidance for primary and secondary care on essential groups for testing

New Zealand Government

COVID-19

For the period 5 October – 18 October 2020.

New and clarified advice for clinicians on community testing for COVID-19.

#### Key messages

- 1. It is critical **to encourage all patients presenting with symptoms consistent with COVID-19 to be tested**, irrespective of region this advice remains unchanged.
- 2. There is no new advice on the 'Essential Groups for Testing' (see Table 1).
- 3. The advice around the testing of asymptomatic individuals has not changed. Please see Table 2.
- 4. DHBs may operate 'pop-up' testing facilities in your community, for additional testing of asymptomatic people.
- 5. The assessment and swabbing for those covered by this guidance is at no charge to the individuals.

#### Encourage all patients presenting with symptoms consistent with COVID-19 to be tested.

### Table 1: Essential groups for testing and isolation advice

Who	Action
<ul> <li>Has symptoms of COVID-19 and meets the higher index of suspicion (HIS) criteria, as follows:</li> <li>In the 14 days prior to illness onset, person has: <ul> <li>had contact with a confirmed or probable case</li> <li>had international travel</li> <li>had direct contact with a person who has travelled overseas (e.g. Customs and Immigration staff, staff at quarantine/isolation facilities)</li> <li>worked on an international aircraft or shipping vessel</li> <li>cleaned at an international airport or maritime port in areas/conveniences visited by international arrivals, or</li> <li>any other criteria requested by the local Medical Officer of Health</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	Test and notify the Medical Officer of Health. The individual must self- isolate while test is pending, irrespective of Alert Level.
Meets the HIS criteria, and has one or more of the following less typical symptoms: fever, diarrhoea, headache, myalgia, nausea/vomiting, or confusion/irritability, and there is not another likely diagnosis.	Test and notify the Medical Officer of Health. The individual must self- isolate while test is pending, irrespective of Alert Level.
Has symptoms of COVID-19. Does not meet the HIS criteria.	Test. Stay home if unwell, isolate while test is pending at Alert levels

	>2, no need to self-isolate at Alert level 1 or 2.
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## Table 2: Testing in asymptomatic people

Who	Action
<ul> <li>Does not have symptoms of COVID-19. Does not meet HIS criteria but are:</li> <li>Health workers, including Aged Residential Care workers</li> <li>Hospitality workers, including hotel, restaurant staff</li> <li>Public-facing tourism workers</li> <li>Public-facing transport workers (eg, bus, taxi, uber)</li> <li>Close contact of border worker groups</li> </ul>	Offer testing if they present to your service. No need to self-isolate while awaiting test result.
<ul> <li>In the Auckland region: Does not have symptoms of COVID-19. Does not meet HIS criteria but is at greater risk of poor health outcomes if they were to contract COVID-19:</li> <li>Māori</li> <li>Pasifika</li> <li>Seniors</li> <li>Pre-existing conditions (for example: chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, high blood pressure, heart disease, diabetes.)</li> </ul>	Offer testing if they present to your service. No need to self-isolate while awaiting test result.
Asymptomatic border worker groups; including those who work at Managed Isolation and Quarantine Facilities	Test as per Border Order. No need to self-isolate while awaiting test result.
Asymptomatic close contacts of a confirmed or probable case	Test as per advice from public health unit.
Asymptomatic New Zealand-based air crew*	Test
